National Tracking Poll – April 2, 2025



Global Info Analytics

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- □ In the last tracking poll carried in October 2024, only 31% of voters said Ghana was headed in the right direction, 62% said it was headed in the wrong direction. Majority of voters in all the regions except Ashanti region, now believe Ghana is headed in the right direction.
- On the job approval of the president, H.E. John Dramani Mahama, 66% of voters approved of the way he is handling his job while 23% disapprove of his performance and 11% did not have an opinion. All party affiliations except NPP approve the performance of the president. Every region approves the president's performance except Ashanti region.
- On the performance of the government as a whole, 21% rate it as excellent, 55% as very good/good, 9% rate it as average and 15% rate it as poor/very poor.

- On voters' standard of living compared to a year ago, 51% say it has improved, 14% say it has worsened, 30% say it is the same and 6% did not have an opinion.
- □ 65% of voters are also optimistic that their standard of living will improve in the next 12 months while 20% say, they are not optimistic it will improve while 14% did not have an opinion.
- On the question of corruption, majority of Ghanaians now believe state of corruption in the country is improving. The poll shows that 56% believe it is improving since the new government took over, 14% say it is getting worse, 23% say it is the same and 7% have no opinion. On the question of whether the government is doing enough in the fight against corruption, 60% of voters said "Yes" while 26% said "No" and 14% did not have an opinion.
- When voters were asked to rank the most corrupt public institutions in Ghana today, the Ghana Police Service tops the chart with a score of 6.43. In 2nd place is the Ghana Immigration Service with a score of 5.86 and the Judiciary in 3rd place with a score of 5.78.
- In a dramatic turn of event, the least perceived corrupt public institutions in Ghana today according to the poll, are the presidency and the military, both tied with a core of 5.27 each, followed by religious leaders with a score of 5.25. The least corrupt per the poll is now ministers and government appointees with a score of 4.61.

- In the 2024 Afrobarometer survey, the presidency was adjudged to be second most corrupt public institution behind the Ghana Police Service.
- Dr George Akuffo Dampare, the former IGP enjoys significant approval from voters for his management of the 2024 election security. The poll shows 14% of voters rate his performance as excellent, 58% as very good/good, 21% rate it as average while 7% as poor/very poor. However, 53% of voters support the decision of the president to replace Dr Dampare as IGP, 29% were neutral and 18% opposed the decision.
- On whether voters have confidence in the new IGP Christian Tetteh Yohuno, 58% say they have confidence in him, 30% were neutral while 12% did not have confidence in him.
- For the chairperson of the Electoral Commission, 10% of voters rated her performance as excellent, 50% as good/very good, 23% rated her performance as average and 17% rated it as poor/very poor.
- On the question of whether "Galamsey" has worsened since John Mahama assumed office, only 10% believe it has worsened, 38% say it has improved, 44% say it is the same while 8% have no opinion. On "Dumsor", 20% of voters say it has worsened, 34% say it has improved while 40% say it is unchanged and 6% did not have an opinion.

- □ The poll also shows that 38% of voters believe the Free Education has improved, 11% say it has worsened, 44% say it is unchanged and 7% did not have an opinion.
- □ The economy, unemployment and education, remain the top issues for with 67%, 67% and 45% respectively.
- On the question of who should be blamed for NPP's defeat in the 2024 general election, 68% of voters who responded to the question blame President Nana Akufo Addo, 40% blame it on Hon Ofori-Atta, 37% blame Dr Mahamudu Bawumia, 33% Dr Mathew Opoku-Prempeh, 32% blame other government appointees, 25% blame the MPs and only 9% blame Kennedy Agyapong.
- The poll also sought to explain why H.E John Mahama won the election by landslide. The data suggests that Dr Bawumia lost grounds to John Mahama in the last weeks and days of the campaign. The poll shows, only 83% of voters who had intended to vote for him actually voted for him on the election day. Nearly 14% switched their votes for Mahama on the day according to polling data and 3% broke out for other candidates.
- For John Mahama, nearly 96% of voters who had intended to vote for him actually voted for him on the election day, 3% switched their votes to Dr Bawumia and 1% went to other candidates. For Nana Kwame Bediako, only 51% of his voters voted for him, while 32% voted for John Mahama and 14% voted for Dr Bawumia.



- However, among those who did not plan to vote but ended up voting, 51% voted for Dr. Bawumia while 36% voted for John Mahama while 13% voted for other candidates.
- In the race for the leadership of NPP in 2028, the poll shows Dr. Bawumia is the clear front runner to lead the party again if voters were to elect NPP flag bearer (note that it is delegates who elect NPP flag bearer). Dr Bawumia attracts 48% of the votes, while Kennedy Agyapong attracts 25%, Dr Osei Adutwum, 13% and the rest of the candidates are on 14%. Among NPP voters, Dr Bawumia attracts 57%, Kennedy Agyapong, 22% and Osei Adutwum, 11%.
- For the NDC, the current vice president, Prof. Jane Naana Opoku-Agyeman, is the front runner with 26%, followed closely by the minister of education, Haruna Iddrisu, 19%. The minister of finance, Hon. Ato Forson is in third place with 12%, the minister of foreign affairs, Hon Okudjeto Ablakwa, 10% and Johnson Asiedu Nketia, the party's general secretary, 10%. Dr Zenator Agyeman-Rawlings, MP for Klottey Korle on 6%, the chief of staff, Hon. Julious Debrah, 6% apiece.
- Among NDC voters, Prof. Opoku Agyeman attracts 20% support, Haruna Iddrisu, 21%, Ato Forson, 15%, Okudjeto Ablakwa, 11%, Asiedu Nketia, 10%, Dr Zenator Rawling, 6%, Julius Debrah, 7%.

Methodology and Approach

- Global InfoAnalytics in an effort to reach every demography, has adopted a mixed mode for the April 2025 poll, web and face-to-face adopted.
- From July 2025, national tracking polls will combine three modes, web, face-to-face and telephone modes.
- The aim is to address some of the challenges faced by each mode, that providing us with the opportunity to reach key demographics which a single model is unable to reach.
