National Tracking Poll – 1st July 2025



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- New poll by Global InfoAnalytics shows that majority of Ghanaians continue to believe that the country is headed in the right direction. 70% of voters now believe the country is headed in the right direction compared to 20% who believe it is headed in the wrong direction. In the April poll, 62% said it is headed in the right direction while 26% said it is headed in the wrong direction. Majority of voters in every region except Ashanti say the country is headed in the right direction.
- The poll also shows that 73% of voters approve of the way the president is doing his job while 19% disapprove. Majority of voters in all the regions approve of his job performance, signalling a major shift in polling history where voters from the stronghold of the main opposition party approve of the performance of the president. All party affiliates approve of the performance of the president except among NPP voters where a slim majority disapprove, amounting to 46% but 43% approve of his performance.
- □ For the government, voters continue to show strong approval of their performance as 18% say they have performed excellent, 61% very good/good, 10% as average and 11% as poor/very poor. In contrast to April 2025 poll, 21% rated the government excellent, 55% as very good/good, 9% average and 15% poor/very poor.



- On President Mahama' handling of the economy, 74% of voters approve of his management of the economy compared to 18% who disapprove. On creating jobs, 67% approve and 22% disapprove. On his handling of the 'galamsey' issue, 65% approve while 24% disapprove.
- On the question of whose policies are responsible for the current economic condition Ghanaians are experiencing today, 62% of voters believe it is a result of the policies of the Mahama administration while 23% say it is due to the policies of Nana Addo's administration and 15% are not sure.
- □ When voters were asked to rate the president on a score of 1 to 10, 1 being very poor and 10 being excellent, the poll shows that the top performing areas for the president is stabilising the cedi, where he scored 7.0 out of 10, followed by the economy and ORAL on 6.6 each, stabilising prices of goods and services, 6.5, stabilizing electricity and water prices, 6.0, Galamsey, 6.0, Dumsor, 5.8 and creating jobs at a 5.6.
- The poll also shows that 55% of voters support the suspended 'Dumsor' Levy while 22% opposed it, 23% were neutral.
- According to the poll, 59% of voters say their standard of living has improved compared to this time last year, only 12% say it has worsened, 25% say it has not changed and 11% did not have an opinion.

- When voters were asked whether they expect their standard of living to improve in the next 12 months, 72% said 'Yes' while 16% said 'No'. 55% of voters also belief that prices of goods and services would mostly decrease in the next 6 months. Only 19% say they expect prices of good and services to increase in the next 6 months.
- On the state of corruption, 60% of voters believe it is improving, up from 56% in April 2025 while 13% said it is getting worse, down from 14% in April 2025. 20% say it is the same down from 23% while those who did not have an opinion remained unchanged at 7%.
- On the fight against corruption, 63% of voters believe the government is doing enough in fighting corruption up from 60% in April 2025 while 23% say they don't believe the government is doing enough, down from 26% in April 2025.
- On corruption perception index, government appointees and the presidency are now perceived to be least corrupt. The Ghana Police, Immigration and Judiciary remains the top three most perceived corrupt public institutions in Ghana today. The Electoral Commission, which occupied 7th position in the April 2025 poll has now moved to 4th position.



- The poll shows that overall corruption perception of public institutions is declining as the poll witnessed improvement in the score for all the public institutions without exception, possibly pointing generally at positive sentiments about corruption perception in public institutions today.
- In the race to lead the New Patriotic Party in the 2028 presidential elections, the poll shows the former vice president and former presidential candidate for the NPP, Dr. Mahamudu Bawumia, leading the race with 56% of the vote among all voters, followed by Hon. Kennedy Agyapong with 23%, Dr. Yaw Osei Adutwum raked in 9%, Hon. Patrick Yaw Boamah with 4%, Bryan Acheampong with 3% and the others at 5%.
- However, among NPP voters, Dr. Bawumia leads with 70%, Hon. Agyapong, 17%, Dr. Adutwum, 7%, Hon. Boamah, 1%, Hon. Acheampong 2% and others, 2%. The poll shows that Dr. Bawumia has extended his lead among general voters from 48% in April 2025 to 57% in June 2025 and among NPP voters, his lead has increased from 57% in April to 70% in June.
- 50% of NDC voters support Dr. Bawumia, 26% support Hon. Agyapong, 10% support Dr. Adutwum, Hon. Boamah has 4% support, Hon. Acheampong also has 4% support and others climax it with 6%



- Analysis of poll also shows that among voters who voted for Dr Bawumia in the 2024 presidential election, 74% would like him to lead NPP, while 14% back Agyapong, 7% prefer Dr Adutwum, 1% prefer Boamah, 3% prefer Acheampong and the rest 1%.
- However, the race is much tighter among voters who did not tell us who they voted for in the 2024 elections and those who did not vote at all. Among those who did not disclose who they voted for, Dr Bawumia leads with 49% and Agyapong 38%, Dr Adutwum has 3%, Boamah, 2% and Acheampong 3%.
- Among those who did not vote, Dr Bawumia is preferred by 36%, 31% prefer Agyapong, 15% prefer Dr Adutwum, 7% prefer Boamah and 5% prefer Acheampong.
- Among NPP voters who voted for Dr Bawumia in 2024 election, 76% prefer Dr Bawumia, 14% Agyapong, 6% Dr Adutwum, 1% Boamah and 2% Acheampong. Among NPP voters who refused to tell us who they voted, 31% prefer D Bawumia, 66% prefer Agyapong and 2% Adutwum.



- For the NDC race, the party's national chairman, Mr. Johnson Asiedu Nketia has surged in the polls compared to April 2025 poll. The poll shows Asiedu Nketia in second place behind the minister of education and former minority leader, Hon. Haruna Iddrisu who maintained his early lead in the race. Hon. Haruna Iddrisu now leads with 27%, Asiedu Nketia, 26%, Ato Forson, 22%, Julius Debrah, 11%, Hon. Okudjeto Ablakwa, 8%, Hon. Zanetor Rawlings, 4% and others, 3%.
- However, among NDC voters, Hon. Haruna Iddrisu leads with 31% support, Asiedu Nketia, 24%, Dr. Ato Forson 22%, Mr. Julius Debrah, 10%, Hon. Okudjeto Ablakwa, 8%, Hon. Zanetor Agyemang-Rawlings, 3% and others, 2%.
- Majority of NPP voters support Mr. Asiedu Nketia, at 32%, while 22% support Hon. Haruna Iddrisu and 20% support Hon. Ato Forson.
- Analysis of the poll shows that Among those who voted for John Mahama in the 2024 elections, 30% prefer Haruna Iddrisu, 22% prefer Asiedu Nketia, 24% prefer Hon Ato Forson, 8% prefer Okudjeto Ablakwa and 3% prefer Zenator Agyeman Rawlings.



- However, among voters who did not disclose who they voted for in the 2024 elections, 30% back Haruna, 15% Nketia, 24% Forson, 10% Debrah, 12% Ablakwa and 5% Agyemang-Rawlings.
- For those who did not vote in the 2024 elections, 19% prefer Haruna, 23% Nketia, 18% Forson, 18%
 Debrah, 15% Ablakwa and 5% Agyemang-Rawlings.
- For NDC voters who voted for John Mahama, 31% prefer Haruna, 22% prefer Nketia, 24% prefer Dr Forson, 10% prefer Debrah, 8% prefer Ablakwa and 3% Agyeman-Rawlings.
- Among those who did not disclose who they voted for, 24% prefer Haruna, 16% prefer Nketia, 18% prefer Dr Forson, 13% Debrah, 13% Ablakwa and 11% Agyemang-Rawlings. For NDC voters who did not vote, 28% Haruna, 26% Nketia, 9% Dr Forson, 19% Debrah, 13% Ablakwa and 2% Agyemang-Rawlings.
- On which party is more attractive, the poll shows that NDC continues to gain more popularity among voters while NPP continues to decline. Voters who openly declare support for NDC now stands at 44% up from 42% in April 2025. On the part of NPP, the party's support base is now 32% compared to 30% in April 2025.
